A Letter from the Principal's Desk







Student Absences

We would like to remind you of the procedures to follow if your child will be absent from school. The school office must be notified directly for all absences in advance where possible. As indicated below, the type of notification required depends on the duration of the absence:

For 1 or 2 days: The absence must be reported directly to the school office before the start of school by telephone, fax or e-mail only, not through individual teachers. If calling the school before 8:00 a.m., please leave a message on the answering machine. A reason for the absence should be provided. For all grades, notification must be given by parents/guardians only, not by students themselves.

For 3 days to 1 month: Submit an Application for Temporary Absence form (available from the school website) directly to the office. Approval must be given by the school administration for all absences due to reasons other than illness. For 1 month to 1 year: Submit an Application for Extended Leave of Absence form (available from the school website) directly to the office. Various conditions apply. Further information may be found on the application form.

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Uniform Reminders

House color polo shirts

Students who were asked to change to the yellow house color polo shirts after initial enrolment at KIST have been allowed to wear their own shirts this year as an interim measure only. However, students will be expected to wear the required yellow shirt from the beginning of the 2009 – 2010 school year. Families are encouraged to purchase the new shirts before June 26, 2009 to take advantage of a special half-price discount being offered until the end of the current school year only. This discount will not be available for orders received after this date. Orders will take approximately two weeks to arrive so please plan in advance. Uniform Order Forms are available on the school website "Forms" page or from the office or reception.

Tracksuits

We have noticed that an increasing number of students are not wearing the required tracksuit. As per all other uniform items, please ensure that all children wear the correct tracksuit (top and pants) as specified by the school.

Club uniforms

Students who are members of sporting clubs are reminded that they should change into their PE uniform before their club begins. Wearing the PE uniform to school in the morning is only allowed if a PE class is scheduled for that day. Furthermore, for clubs that have original parkers or other special uniform items, these items are not part of the formal school uniform and should not be worn as such during class time. They may be worn only during club time or at tournaments. In addition, students are required to wear the correct training pants and shirts as specified by the school.

Observing the Joy of Learning







"Reading about new ideas does not always mean that we need to implement something new...it can encourage us to observe with new perspective and value even the simplest of learning experiences"

I have recently been inspired by the article "Joy in School - Joyful learning can flourish in school - if you give joy a chance" (Wolk, S. (2008) *Educational Leadership*. 66(1)). Steve Wolk suggests that 'by helping students find the pleasure in learning, we can make learning infinitely more successful'. Wolk highlights 10 ways in which we can support joy in learning. These include giving students choices, letting students create things and experiences the outdoors. In reading about these ideas I have been inspired to think about the opportunities we give children to choose, create and explore in the outside environment, thus encouraging joyful learning. Reading about new ideas does not always mean that we need to implement something new, however it can encourage us to observe with a new perspective at what we are already doing and to acknowledge and value even the simplest of learning experiences.

Once such experience took place recently after a string of rainy days in February. Rainy days in schools, means inside play time, which can be a frustrating time for both students and teachers. When the rain finally clears and students are able to go outside again Mother Nature presents us with an array of learning opportunities. This year the rain left us with a very large puddle in the middle of our play-ground. Although a bit of a hazard for some play, this puddle provided students with the opportunity to make choices, create things and explore the outside environment. Students were observed finding joy in this puddle in a variety of ways, some with eager enthusiasm and others with shy curiosity. Students found many different ways to explore the natural world and its phenomena, many of which link directly to core understandings in our science scope and sequence.

Explorations began with students standing around the puddle, observing the light and their faces reflected in the muddy water. Some students discovered what happened if they disturbed the water, observing the ripples and the effect these had on their reflection. Children laughed as they distorted their image and began to develop both curiosity and understanding about light, reflection and refraction. As the weather continued favorably and the water in the puddle began to dry up, students continued their explorations by investigating the change occurring in the water and the earth. As the water evaporated and a large mud pit remained, students began a sensorial exploration. Many students discovered that the earth contained a large amount of clay and that the texture and properties of this allowed them to create solid objects. These explorations helped to develop their understanding of materials and their changing states as well as the way humans use and manipulate materials from the natural environment.

By closely observing the students in their playground experiences following the days of rain it has been inspiring to see how such a simple experience can offer opportunities for our students to develop their scientific understandings. It has also been encouraging to observe that by allowing students choice about their interaction with the natural world, giving them the freedom to create and to interact with the outside environment, we have helped to encourage joy and pleasure in learning that can support both developing understandings and their success as learners.

I encourage you to take the time to observe your children, in the smallest and simplest of experiences. Observe the links they are making to their developing understanding of the world, as well as the opportunities for experiencing joy. Sharing our observations of these experiences helps to remind us that joyful learning is all around us, if only we know where to look for it.

Throughout this school year, four PYP Parent Information Sessions have been offered. In Term One, three sessions were offered. Catering separately for the ECE and Primary sections of our school, these sessions focused primarily on introducing parents to the framework of the *Primary Years Programme*.

On the 19th of February, 40 interested parents attended the fourth PYP Parent Information Session. The key focus of this evening was inquiry; what it looks like, how it happens and how parents can support inquiry at home. Much of the evening involved discussion and I would like to thank all of the parents who attended, for not only making the time to come, but also for their willingness to contribute and share ideas.

During the evening, parents were also introduced to the *backward-by-design* planning strategy which teachers use; beginning with assessment tasks, before planning learning experiences.

By the end of the evening, it was clear that parents had developed a better idea of our inquiry-based curriculum as well as the kinds of decisions that teachers make when planning assessment tasks and learning experiences for students.

The final PYP Unit Overviews were sent out in April 2009. Accompanying each overview was an extended summary of the *Learner Profile*, as well as ideas for ways that all parents can support their children at home.

Future parent information sessions will be offered later in 2009. In order for us to cater for parents needs, we are asking for your feedback. If you could take the time to complete the survey below and return it to school, this will allow us to gain a better idea of the kinds of information you require to understand and support your child through the Primary Years Programme.

- The Grade 12s had a grueling week to the start of their Spring Term with a week of Mock Exams and little time to enjoy the beautiful cherry blossoms. The Grade 12 teachers and students have been extra busy ensuring all exam preparation and moderation work has been completed. As a number of the Grade 12 teaching staff are IB DP examiners too, there has been a whirl of heightened activity throughout this area of the school. I would like to wish our graduating class "Good luck" in their upcoming exams and remind them of what Thomas Jefferson, the 3rd President of the United States said, "I'm a great believer in luck, and find the harder I work, the more I have of it".
- On the evening of April 15th, Grade 10 students and their parents heard from our DP Coordinator, Mr. Mark Cowe, regarding subject selections for the upcoming academic year. A very exciting development in our subject selection from next year is the offering of new subjects; Chemistry, Math Studies, Music and Psychology. The School Board of Directors, School Staff and teachers strive hard to offer the best we can to our students and this is another achievement in our continuing growth as a school.
- In the same regard, another step in consolidating our school growth has been the adoption of a Positions of Leadership model in the Secondary School. Currently the school has IB curriculum coordinators, an ESL Coordinator, Athletics Director and a CAS and AoI Coordinator. Next year we will also have dedicated Subject Area Coordinators. This will formalize and recognize in an official capacity the type of work many teachers have taken on over the past years in developing and running the various faculties in the Secondary. A number of these positions have already been filled and I would like to congratulate our new appointees.

- One further development is the increase in our provision for Guidance Counseling. From next year instead of the half-time position we have had over the past 3 years, we will have the equivalent of one full-time Guidance Counselor. In turn, our Grade 6 students will visit TIS on May 22nd.
- In other news, as usual, students and teachers have been very busy with a number of events going on. This term some secondary students assisted at the Primary Concert and Grade 11 students and Mr. John Fortin also continued to fund raise for Habitat for Humanity on concert day. Also Mr. Daryl Bates and the Grade 12 students set up their DP Art Exhibition at Toyosu Culture Centre and it looked fantastic.
- Sporting events, which also connect us with the wider international school community, continue this term. Soccer, softball, and baseball teams are all training hard for various matches. I would like to thank their coaches, Mr. Tony Henderson, Mrs. Fumie Komatsu, Mr. Andrew Hough, Mr. Jordi Casas and Mr. Terry Weston for their efforts in these sporting arenas.
- Finally, I would like to thank the students who have been involved with Mr. Michael Bates and me in re-shaping the Student Representative Council. We had two meetings to decide on a constitution. At the final meeting it was decided to amend the constitution which was presented by Pyay Phyo Oo, a Grade 10 student, for his MYP Personal Project, and adopt it as our SRC Constitution. Nominations for the executive were called and I am happy to say that Carmina Mancenon, Disha Parikh, James Ha and Soo Min Hwang form our SRC Executive.
